Engage the class in naming examples of "Reasonable Conduct" and "Misconduct." Replace this printed

description paragraph with the Student-suggested examples.

Student:

It is reasonable to expect students:

- (1) to cooperate with teachers and peers [BEHAVIOR = B]
- (2) to participate by being prepared with classwork, materials, parent signatures and recording homework completely [ORGANIZATION = 0]

Because cooperation and participation is a reasonable expectation, the **daily calendar block** ought to remain blank/empty. The code **B** or **O** followed by teacher initials indicate negative choices on the part of the student. The student is responsible to obtain a parent signature weekly – or daily if that is more helpful to the parent and student or is required by a teacher.

Reasonable conduct includes, but is not limited to, the following examples of <u>student-named</u> behavior: including others, listening to others, demonstrating a positive attitude, honesty, respectfulness, attentiveness, following directions, keeping on task, meeting deadlines, self-control . . .

Misconduct includes, but is not limited to, the following examples of <u>student-named</u> disruptive behavior: acting bored, rudeness, showing disrespect, sleeping, calling out, lying, sarcasm, talking excessively and loudly during quiet time, rolling eyes, looking annoyed, ignoring directions, continued misbehavior after correction, playing around, dissing others, goofing off, negative attitudes . . .

Student choices affect eligibility for participation in class and school privileges. Each BLANK CALENDAR BLOCK indicates grade-appropriate *RESPONSE-ABILITY* for the day and it represents one eligibility point.

Student choices affect report card grades.

1 = Zero instances of irresponsibility during the marking period

2 = 1 & 2 instances; 3 = 3 instances; 4 = 4 instances; 5 = 5-7 instances

++ Any student who totals 6 or more incidents of irresponsibility during a marking period will arrange to give one hour of RESPONSIBLE service to the school during recess, lunchtime, after school, Saturday, or during an evening or weekend event.
